

B. STUDENT BOARD MEMBERS & YEAR END REPORT

President Zamora announced the student board members would like to present their thoughts about what they learned from being student representatives this year and talk about government advocacy.

CENTRAL HIGH: Austin Laugen and Rebecca Briesmoore from Central High presented a PowerPoint report on what they learned from being student board members this year. They learned how our schools run and what keeps things going; how much work happens behind the scenes; how much money flows through the district; and how the board and government work together. Some improvements they would like to see are more microphones at the student board table, having the discussion move forward faster (less loops) on some topics, providing students with handout materials in advance, and maybe having "Monday Night Football" shown on a projector in the background at times. Benefits they saw were friendliness and openness of board members, feeling board members were interested in the opinions they had from a high school perspective, food and gifts from the board secretary, listening to public opinion on issues, and having students involved in legislative advocacy with the trip to see the Capitol in Des Moines. They talked about community involvement and making sure the topics under discussion are well publicized so people will know what things might affect them at school. They thought providing cookies or treats to the public at the end of the meeting would get more people out, and they encouraged students getting extra credit for attending the meetings and more credit if they spoke during open forum. Austin talked about his future endeavors and how he might consider running for the school board at a later date. He was planning a career in engineering and probably won't go any further into government at least at this time. Rebecca talked about considering a state legislative position down the way. They appreciated having this opportunity to learn about the district and government first hand from being on the Board.

NORTH HIGH: Brion Coleman and Nicole Woodson both thanked the Board for the opportunity to be representatives this year. They appreciated how board members keep student achievement as a first priority. They learned a lot about being a board member and it wasn't just saying yes or no to topics. There was a lot of research that went into discussion and decision making. Board members had to read and study so much material before decisions were made and they had to be able to talk about the reasons for voting one way or another. Nicole was appreciative of all the support for students and it was good to actually have a chance to voice an opinion and have a say on issues. Nicole said there were a lot of disputes on topics but people have to do what they think is best for the district and students. Brion agreed with the Central students about the need for more microphones for students to use during the meetings. Nicole said board members really showed how they cared about students and she thought they were great people. She would like to see improvements in advertising to our schools and about our buildings. More people would probably attend when certain topics were on the agenda if they knew about the discussions. Brion said he would be studying civil engineering in college but he wasn't sure he could handle running for a school board position. Nicole thought she might be involved with the school board and she can see how this was important because it will shape the life of her children in the future. She is looking at college and will have a pre-med emphasis.

Vice President Roberson praised the students and thanked them for their work. He thought comments coming from the younger generation really meant a lot to him

because they keep things real. He appreciated what they had to say and hoped board members would consider some of the suggestions. Vice President Roberson presented certificates to Austin Laugen, Rebecca Briesmoore, Brion Coleman, and Nicole Woodson in recognition of their accomplishments and commitment to being student board representatives. The certificate said, "In recognition of your service to the youth in our community and for serving as a Student Board member for the Davenport Community School District, this award is presented to Austin, Rebecca, Brion, and Nicole. Best wishes were extended to all the student board members from Central, Kimberly Center, North, and West high schools.

He believed they had done a lot over the year, have been part of a cohort group, participated in the meetings, and the students were true leaders. No matter what they do, he felt they will continue to be leaders in the community and state. He wished them the best. President Zamora agreed with all the comments and also said it was fun having the students at the meetings.

A. Board Secretary/Treasurer Retirement

Acceptance of the retirement request from the Board Secretary was recommended.

MOTION: Director Roberson moved, with reluctance, the Board approve the retirement request of Linda Smith Kortemeyer, Board Secretary, with an effective date of June 30, 2009. Total years of service to the District were 19 years, 5 months, and include 14.5 years as Board Secretary. Director Tupper seconded the motion.

Board members expressed their appreciation and thanks for the work done by the Board Secretary during the last 15 years. They individually talked about ways in which she was an integral part of the Board. Board members wished her the best in retirement and appreciated her thoughtfulness, professionalism, and abilities in carrying out her responsibilities. Mr. Almanza mentioned how much history of the district Mrs. Kortemeyer knew, and he appreciated her abilities to help get records required for work that needed to be done. He said she was an essential part of the team and will be missed.

Student board members also thanked Mrs. Kortemeyer and talked about ways she helped them learn about the Board. They depended on her for getting their board packets on Saturday and for keeping them informed of meetings, events, and other opportunities in the District. They enjoyed working with her and appreciated things she did for them. President Zamora also expressed her appreciation and wished Linda fun in retirement.

The vote on the motion was called and recorded as follows. Ayes: Roberson, Tupper, Krumwiede, De Fauw, Johanson, Clewell, and Zamora. The motion carried unanimously.

B. Master Teacher Two-Year Contract 2009-2011

The administration recommended approval of the Master Contract

MOTION: Director Roberson moved the Board approve the terms of the two-year negotiated master contract for teachers with the Davenport School District for 2009-2011. Director Clewell seconded the motion.

The vote on the motion was called and recorded as follows. Ayes: Roberson, Clewell, Johanson, De Fauw, and Zamora. Abstaining: Tupper and Krumwiede. Motion carried.

c. District Calendar for Traditional Schools 2009-2010

The administration recommended the Board approve the dates shown on the "2009-2010 district calendar" for traditional schools.

MOTION: Director Krumwiede moved the Board approve the administration's recommendation for the dates shown on the 2009-2010 district calendar for traditional schools. Director Clewell seconded the motion.

Director Johanson asked questions about the number of school days and how it relates to Iowa Code. Mrs. McClurg explained the 178 days is listed because of the length of the instructional day which complies with Iowa Code. We asked for a waiver and have done so for the last 10 years for the same plan for time of instruction. There was discussion about parent teacher conferences and how they were used in the calendar. According to Mrs. McClurg, Iowa code requires 5.5 hours of instruction per day and our students receive 6 hours per day which exceeds the requirement. There are 185 days of which 7 are in-service dates for professional development.

The vote on the motion was called and recorded as follows. Ayes: Krumwiede, Clewell, Johanson, De Fauw, Roberson, Tupper, and Zamora. The motion carried unanimously.

d. Banking Services Contract Extension

The administration recommended a three-year contract extension for banking services with THE National Bank.

MOTION: Director Clewell moved the Board approve the three year contract extension for banking services with THE National Bank as described. Director De Fauw seconded the motion.

The vote on the motion was called and recorded as follows. Ayes: Clewell, De Fauw, Johanson, Tupper, Krumwiede, Roberson, and Zamora. The motion carried unanimously.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

VI. DISCUSSION ITEMS

A. Textbook Adoption Series for 2009-2010

Members of the administration reported on materials and textbooks they were recommending for adoption for the "2009-2010" school year. Staff members were introduced as Mike Garnica, Betty Griffin, Kim Gasaway, Laura Isele, Kathy Learn, and Juli Staszewski.

Mrs. Staszewski talked about the process for reviewing materials for curriculum areas. The adoptions will cover new purchases, updates, kits,

and supporting items. The areas being adopted are for the science curriculum, Spanish, Speech, Literature & Language 7, Language Arts 8, Sewing & Relationships/Clothing & Design, Computer Apps II, Intro to Electronics, Psychology (concurrent credit), Environmental Science (dual credit through Scott Community College), Employment Strategies (dual credit through SCC), JAVA programming (dual credit SCC), Visual Basic (dual credit SCC) automotive Brakes (dual credit SCC), and Connected Mathematics 2.

There were copies of the materials for reference and review by the Board. The textbook adoptions were studied and reviewed by committees prior to the recommendations coming to the Board for discussion. Board members spent time asking about the textbooks, comparison of items, techniques for improving textbooks and computer applications, costs, and other areas. They talked about the future of computers and e-readers in classrooms and difficulties to consider. They talked about effectiveness of teachers and changing methods of instruction.

Board members wondered if students preferred having a book or using electronic methods for studying. The student board members talked about taking classes on line and some of the drawbacks with not having a hard-covered textbook to use. There are some problems with interfacing, but technology is always changing and improvements are happening. The students all agreed they liked having a textbook to take home and use. They also thought the e-readers will be good in the future and work better.

Mike Garnica talked about having student learners in mind when curriculum was studied and that was the key to selection of materials. Each of the facilitators talked about their areas of specialization and how the materials would be used in class. Director Krumwiede asked if the new materials would take the Iowa Core Curriculum into consideration. Kathy Learn address this question and assured the Board the core curriculum was considered during the selection review and process.

There were questions about having adequate numbers of books and materials for all students in the classroom. There were comments about some problems and Mrs. Staszewski said she would follow up on some of the areas of concern she heard about tonight. Director De Fauw shared her experiences with having children in classes and they don't have books to take home. There are sets of books in the classroom but there are problems with checking them out to take home. Mrs. Staszewski also talked about the time table for making textbook adoptions and indicated it should be no more than 10 years before the textbooks are reviewed. The schools receive certain amounts of books for classrooms and they can use building funds for extra copies if they are needed. We try to base the number of books on enrollment at buildings but that can change during the year.

Director Tupper asked about monitoring the materials in buildings and how this was handled by buildings. The superintendent talked about the current inventory system and moving toward a textbook management system in the future that will help with the textbooks in classes. Director Tupper was

concerned with the ordering timeline and wondered if teachers would have enough time to look over the materials before school started. He asked about training and professional development with new textbooks. Mrs. Staszewski said they can't order the books until July 1 because of the budget. The books will come in by the end of July and then are distributed to the buildings before school starts. There also will be opportunities for the teachers to get the materials early in June and to start working with their preparation during the summer.

Kimberly Gasaway talked about the working with the buildings and consulting with teachers on the curriculum. She explained how there would be work in June to help teachers become familiar with the materials. She spoke about professional development and wanting teachers to be comfortable with the new textbooks and resources. Director Tupper asked about the number of kits ordered for classrooms and if the numbers were sufficient. There was discussion about how the class kits were used and how outside resources were included for implementation. Mrs. Staszewski assured the Board the textbook selection had a lot of research behind the decision and they have looked at what was best for the students. This was their highest priority. Mrs. Staszewski then went through the entire process for selecting the textbooks for recommendation to be adopted. She talked about research and best practices, studying criteria, reviewing literature, visiting other districts that use the textbooks, bringing in teachers to review and having groups use them in some classes.

Director Roberson asked how long it took to order additional books if there are insufficient numbers for a class. Mrs. Staszewski said it was a fairly fast turn around of about one week from the order date. Mr. Almanza also mentioned there were teacher supplements and other resource materials for the teachers to use. Director Johanson asked if there was any research about a correlation between the age of textbooks used and the achievement gap for students. There was some discussion about test scores and improvements being seen with newer textbooks recently adopted. More information would be provided to the Board if possible.

VIII. BOARD REPORTS

President Zamora commented about the wonderful publication from Central High students for 2008-2009 "Indigo Ink". Board members received copies and were very impressed with the writing. If people wanted these, they should contact Central High. The students did the artwork and stories which were exceptional.

Director Krumwiede was appreciative of the recognition board members received tonight and the note which read, "Education can be a puzzle at times, but we know how good our board members are figuring out problems. Just a little something fun! We applaud your dedication and work." He thanked the board secretary for the little gift bag.

Director De Fauw said, "Congratulations" to the Wood 7-8 Band, Orchestra and Choir on their successful performances at Saturday's "Music In The Parks" competition in Chicago. Schools from over 9 states in three classifications were represented. The highlights of the day were:

- All of the Wood performances were judged to be Superior ratings (no other school competing had that honor)
- The Band missed 1st place by ½ point with a 2nd place; class A finish.
- The Orchestra scored a first place; Class A (2 years in a row)
- The Choir scored 1st Place in Class A; Grand Champions in the junior high choral Division (3 years in a row)
- And most importantly, the student's behaviors were exceptional. They represented Wood, Davenport and Iowa superbly!!

Director Clewell also talked about Central High and some wonderful articles about students in the paper. He again praised student board members for their service and dedication.
